- 9. Welcoming campus
- 10. Opportunity for an IU or Purdue degree


New Beginner Entering Student Survey **Tipping Point in Choosing IUPUI Top 5 Themes**

- 1. Affordability/opportunities for financial aid and scholarship

- 2. Close to home
