

**2015 NSSE SURVEY
SUMMARY REPORT FOR
SCHOOL OF EDUCATION**

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Introduction

The National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE) was developed to document dimensions of quality in undergraduate education and provides information and assistance to college, universities, and other organizations to improve student learning. The final NSSE report consists of four scales called Benchmarks of Engagement Indicators (Benchmarks). These Engagement Indicators provide valuable information about distinct aspects of student engagement. The Engagement Indicators are grouped into four themes. The four themes are Level of Academic Challenge, Learning with Peers, Experiences with Faculty, Campus Environment.

The following report is a summary of responses for the School of Education compared to responses from students enrolled in similar programs at peer institutions. This report organizes the NSSE items according to Engagement Indicators, or clusters of highly related items that measure a specific aspect of the educational experiences of a group of students. Each Engagement Indicator is nested under a corresponding theme with which it is associated. The table below depicts the number of items corresponding with an Engagement Indicator in each theme for both first-year and senior respondents identified as an “area of strength” (an effect size of 0.1 standard deviations greater than the Peer Institution average), “asset to protect” (between 0.05 and 0.1 standard deviations greater than the Peer Institution average), “issue to be mindful of” (between -0.01 and -0.2 standard deviations below Peer Institution average) and “opportunity for improvement” (an effect size of -0.1 standard deviations below the Peer Institution average or more.) The Peer institution mean represents the mean from students at peer institutions in programs similar to those in your school.

In spring semester 2015, a census of 4,382 seniors and 3,112 first-year students at IUPUI and IUPUC were invited to complete the NSSE survey. A total of 931 seniors responded to the survey for a response rate of 21.2%. Similarly, 592 first-year students responded to the survey for a response rate of 19.0%.
